Minimum Entry Requirements: GCSE English Language Grade 5/6

Course Outline:

The course is split into three modules which cover poetry, prose and plays from across the centuries. You will look in detail at the way that writers communicate their ideas; how their work is shaped by the social, historical and literary context of their times and how people have responded to famous works of literature, both now and in the past. AQA English Literature A's approach works from the belief that no text exists in isolation but is the product of the time in which it was produced and so students are encouraged to explore the relationships that exist between texts and the contexts in which they are written, received and understood. Students are also encouraged to debate and challenge the interpretations of other readers as they develop their own informed personal response to texts.

Course Content:

Unit 1 – Love Through the Ages: Exploration of this central literary theme of love in texts over time. This will involve study of a play, poetry and prose.

Unit 2 – Texts in Shared Contexts: Modern Times: Literature from 1945 – present day. Here texts will be explored within a narrower and clearly defined time period - Taking the end of WW2 as its historical starting point. Literature's engagement with some of the social, political, personal and literary issues, which have helped shape the latter half of the 20th Century and the early decades of the 21st Century, will be explored.

Unit 3 – Independent Critical Study: Texts Across Time: Comparative critical study of two texts, at least one of which must have been written pre-1900

Unit 2:

- Section A The poetry of Carol Ann Duffy
- Section B Unseen prose

Unit 3:

 One extended essay (2500 words) comparing two texts of your choice. This is assessed by teachers and moderated by AQA.

Equipment required / Approx. Cost: Students need to purchase their own copies of the texts – approximately eight in total.

Independent Study: One hour of independent study for each hour taught.
